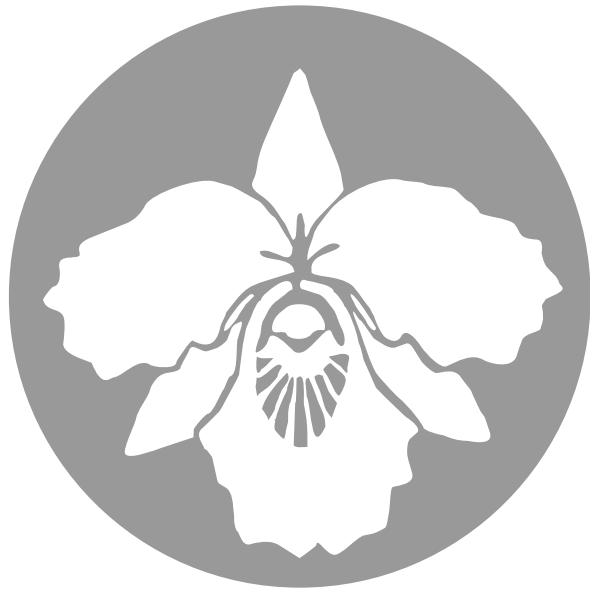

Show Entry Rules and Regulations

NOTE: The schedule has been revised to reflect the new nomenclature used to produce the 2014 Mid-America class list for genera.

1. No entries will be accepted for judging after 5:00 PM on setup day. Subsequent entries will be exhibited but not judged.
2. No one other than properly authorized persons will be permitted in the show area during judging.
3. Any plant entered for a cultural award (e.g. a specimen plant) must have been the property of the exhibitor for at least one year.
4. The appropriate class for intergeneric hybrids shall be the first class for intergeneric crosses which lists one of the genera making up the hybrid. (See lists of genera belonging in each class at the registration desk.)
5. Any plant can be entered in one of classes 10-100 and **also** in class 102.
6. In the event the exhibitor of cut flowers cannot be present, the Show Committee will display the material to best advantage.
7. There are no fees to the exhibitor for entries or assistance in the preparation of exhibits.
8. If the return of materials is required, it will be returned at exhibitor's expense. All exhibits not claimed by exhibitor or the disposal of which is not specified will be distributed by the Show Committee.
10. Neither the Cambridge Hespeler Arena nor the Central Ontario Orchid Society is responsible for the loss or damage of any plants, blooms, containers or other property of exhibitors. However, every precaution will be exercised for their safety.
11. Exhibition tables will be furnished without cost; however, cloth, foliage plants, etc. must be furnished by the exhibitor.
12. Foliage plants, moss, etc., may supplement exhibits, but no artificial plants or foliage of any kind will be permitted, with the exception of artificial grass used as a floor covering. Orchids are to be the **only** flowering plants in the displays. Artificially coloured flowers are not allowed.
13. Any lighting used for effect is the responsibility of and must be furnished by the exhibitor and must be coordinated with the staging com-

mittee. Effect lighting not colour-corrected may be turned off during judging.

14. All cards displaying exhibitor's names will be provided by the Show Committee. No other identification signs will be permitted.
15. Reasonable effort will be made to provide the amount of space requested, but should the space available be less than expected, the Show Committee reserves the right to limit space allocated to any exhibitor.
16. Cut flowers and flowering plants will be considered equally in judging.
17. Judges and Clerks are expected to familiarize themselves with the show entry rules and regulations.
18. All plants or cut flowers exhibited for competition must be properly labelled without the name of the owner until judged.
19. Each competitor agrees, upon making an entry, to abide by the rules and regulations of the show.
20. First, Second, Third Place and Honourable Mention ribbons may be awarded in each class at the discretion of the judges. Trophies will be awarded as designated. Judges have the authority to award or withhold any ribbon or trophy and may subdivide any class where warranted.
21. We aim for six or seven judging teams of one certified judge, two lay judges and at least two clerks. The judges decisions will be final.
22. All questions regarding the interpretation or application of rules shall be referred to the Show Chair. His/Her decision shall be final.
23. In addition to the ribbons and/or trophies awarded by the judges, plants and flowers may be considered by the judges for American Orchid Society point awards. Each person entering plants or flowers in the show agrees to accept any award given and to pay fees for such awards to the American Orchid Society. If any entrant does not wish to accept the AOS awards, he must inform the Show Committee before entering his plants.
24. No part of an exhibit shall be removed until 4:15 PM Sunday. The show may be ended at the discretion of the Show Chair.
25. All shipment of plants, cut flowers or exhibit materials to be displayed for the exhibitor by COOS must be received no later than 4:00pm of setup day. These materials should be addressed to Cambridge Hespeler

Arena, 640 Ellis Road, Cambridge, ON to the attention of the COOS Show Chair.

26. Entries not in accord with the schedule will risk being disqualified at the Judge's discretion, and the Show Committee reserves the right to remove all inferior exhibits or any part of them.
27. All entry tags must be removed from all exhibits when judging is complete and before the show is opened to the public. Volunteers will do this if exhibitor is unavailable. All possible care will be taken but COOS will not accept any liability for damages.
28. No sales tables shall be allowed in the exhibit area. Any plants sold which are part of an exhibit shall not be removed from the exhibit before the show is closed.
29. Commercial growers wishing to sell their orchids during the show must place a reasonable exhibit in the show.
30. Exhibits and all parts of exhibits must be pest and disease free. Exhibits and plants within an exhibit may be removed at the judges discretion. Such action may disqualify the exhibit or plant. Volunteers will carry out the judges decision if exhibitor is unavailable. All possible care will be taken but COOS will not accept any liability for damages.
31. A display can be entered only once in classes 1-3.
32. AOS Awards. This show has been approved for AOS judging. All flowers, whether entered for ribbon judging or not, will be considered for AOS awards unless otherwise marked by the exhibitor. If the flowers have previously been exhibited at an AOS approved function, they are considered to have been screened and therefore, are not eligible for further consideration. They should be marked, "Not for AOS judging". This will not disqualify the flower from consideration in the proper ribbon or trophy class. Submission of plants or cut flowers for judging shall obligate the exhibitor to accept any award granted and to pay any fees connected with such an award except where he or she has clearly indicated before the judging that the entry is not to be AOS judged.
33. All plant vendors must enter an Open Competition class for their display.

Open Classes Individual Plants in Flower or Cut Flowers

In general, blush colours and two-toned flowers should be entered in the "Other Colors" classifications with the exception of Phalaenopsis which has a dedicated blush class.

D. Cattleya Alliance

10. Encyclia, Epidendrum and Prosthechea species.
11. Encyclia, Epidendrum and Prosthechea hybrids and intergenerics, but excluding Cattleya and Guarianthe.
12. Brassavola & Rhyncholaelia species, hybrids and intergenerics other than above, but excluding Cattleya and Guarianthe.
13. Broughtonia species, hybrids and intergenerics other than above, but excluding Cattleya and Guarianthe.
14. Traditional Laelia and Sophronitis species, hybrids and intergenerics other than above, but excluding Cattleya and Guarianthe.

17. Cattleya and Guarianthe hybrids and intergenerics other than above, Lavender/Mauve, flowers equal to 10 cm (4 inches) or less.
18. Cattleya and Guarianthe hybrids and intergenerics other than above, Lavender/Mauve, flowers larger than 10 cm (4 inches).
19. Cattleya and Guarianthe hybrids and intergenerics other than above, White.
20. Cattleya and Guarianthe hybrids and intergenerics other than above, Semi-alba.
21. Cattleya and Guarianthe hybrids and intergenerics other than above, Yellow/Orange, flowers equal to 10 cm (4 inches) or less.
22. Cattleya and Guarianthe hybrids and intergenerics other than above, Yellow/Orange, flowers larger than 10 cm (4 inches).

23. Cattleya and Guarianthe hybrids and intergenerics other than above, Red/Red shades, flowers equal to 10 cm (4 inches) or less.
- 23a. Cattleya and Guarianthe hybrids and intergenerics other than above, Red/Red shades, flowers larger than 10 cm (4 inches).
24. Cattleya and Guarianthe hybrids and intergenerics other than above, Other colours.
25. Cattleya allied genera hybrids and intergenerics other than above.

E. Cyripedium Alliance

Note: Color in Paphiopedilum hybrids is based on the dominant flower color.

27. Paphiopedilum species, normally one flower when mature.

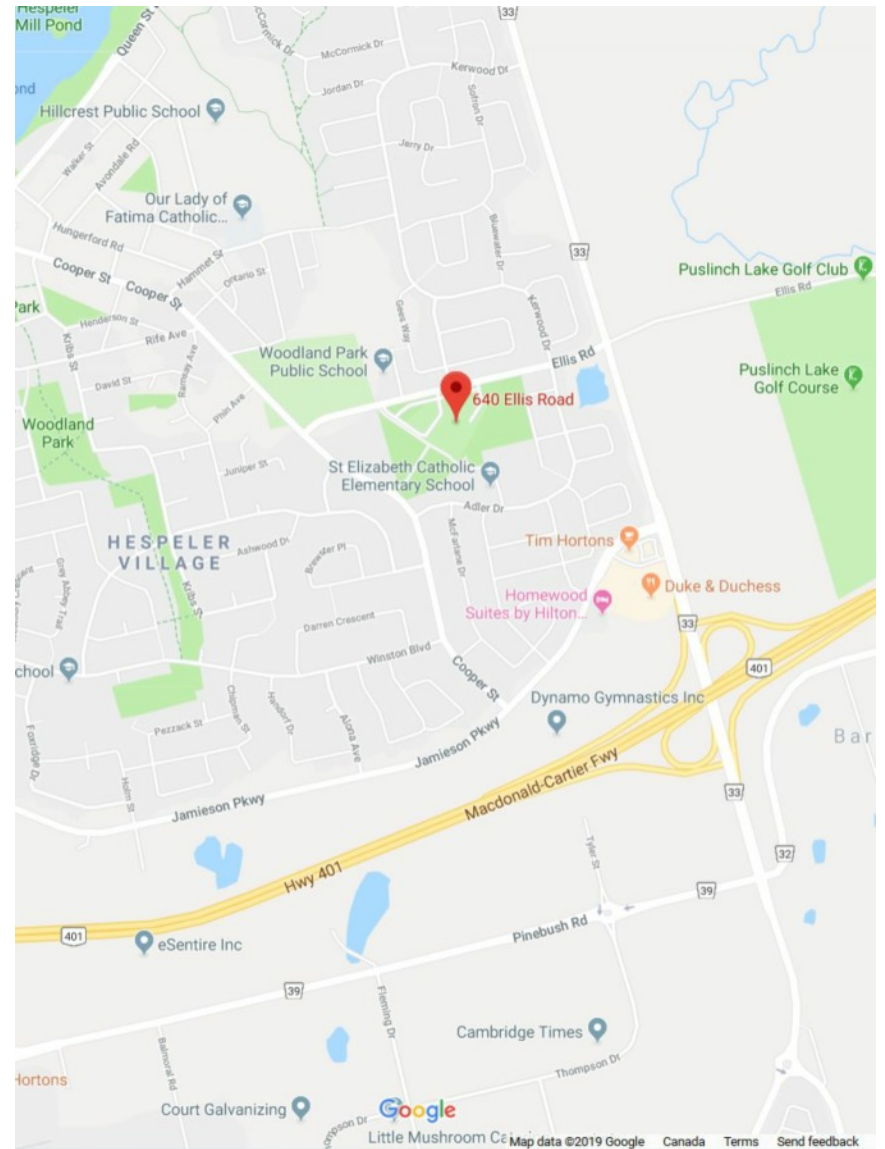
